



- We are contracting with Trotwood-Madison City Schools, serving children and families at the district's popular Early Learning Center.
- We are preparing to open four classrooms at Goodwill Easterseals Miami Valley's new West Campus Community Center in Trotwood where we'll serve infants, toddlers, and preschoolers.
- Finally, we are so thrilled to announce that we're almost across the finish line on our years-in-the-making Lincoln Hill project, a new state-of-the-art child care center for East Dayton that will serve 250 children and their families. Stay tuned for more about this initiative that epitomizes our commitment to partnerships.

We are so fortunate to have a staff of nearly 500-strong who are totally committed to lifting children and families out of poverty. We are successful because of their incredible passion and the support we get from every corner of **our CommUNITY**. Thank you!



We give FAMILIES early learning CHOICES

As southwest Ohio's largest Head Start organization, MVCDC has been serving families and children experiencing poverty for nearly 60 years. We provide high quality early learning and child care to ensure children start kindergarten on track, and we help families become financially stable.

MVCDC assists families earning under 100% of the Federal Poverty Level, children in foster and kinship care, children experiencing homelessness and children with disabilities. This year, the Office of Head Start expanded eligibility to all children receiving SNAP — or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program — benefits. Generally, a mother of two must have an annual income of \$23,030 or less to be eligible for MVCDC services.

Our services for children are comprehensive. We support them in reaching developmental milestones, getting appropriate health care and early intervention services, learning social-emotional skills, eating well and more.

Every Head Start family has a Family Support Specialist, Home Visitor or Coach who helps parents and caregivers set goals to improve their and their children's lives. Some parents may be focused on going back to school or finding a better job. Others may need better housing or more reliable transportation.



Families may choose to enroll their child at an MVCDC-operated site or a community-based partner site, including school-based programs; center-based programs; or family child care.



PART-DAY

3½ hours/day M-Th AM and PM sessions, part year

WE'RE REACHING A HIGHER PERCENTAGE OF ELIGIBLE CHILDREN!

The good news this year is that MVCDC is reaching a higher percentage of families who are eligible for services. That's because parents and caregivers are more comfortable sending their children to early learning now that we've adapted to living with COVID-19. In addition, families receiving SNAP benefits automatically qualify, thanks to a federal rule change. Enrollment has become easier than ever for many families experiencing poverty.

Head Start

Head Start provides early learning for children from age 3 to 5. Our evidence-based curriculum focuses on getting young learners ready for kindergarten. Children also receive developmental screenings and are connected to health-care providers, including for dental and vision needs. Families get resources and coaching to teach their children at home.

Early Head Start

Early Head Start serves children from 6 weeks to age 3 and income-eligible pregnant women. Children receive developmental screenings and early intervention services if needed. Mothers-to-be get help with prenatal care, and families learn parenting skills and how to promote their child's early brain development.

Though high quality child care is expensive and difficult to find for young children of all ages, care for infants and toddlers is even harder to access and more costly than for preschoolers. Many families can't work or attend school because they don't have child care for their infants and toddlers.

MVCDC assists families who are eligible for Medicaid to get this need-based health insurance for their children and themselves. We also encourage families to choose a medical "home' for their child to ensure quality continuity of care. In addition, children are connected to dentists and optometrists.

Not surprisingly, many families are playing catch-up for routine and well-child care in the wake of COVID-19.




COVID-19'S FALLOUT CONTINUES



In normal times, local Head Start agencies must have an average enrollment of 97% of their funded seats. Because many families experiencing poverty don't have stable housing — a challenge that forces them to move in and out of early learning programs — meeting this mandate can be onerous. COVID-19's fallout further compounded the difficulty.

MVCDC, like Head Start agencies nationally, struggled to meet the 97% enrollment benchmark. MVCDC's enrollment in Head Start averaged 75% of funded seats; 92% for Early Head Start; and 92% at our Early Head Start-Child Care Partnership programs.

MVCDC's partnership with Miamisburg City Schools began in 2017 when the district began leasing space to MVCDC to offer Head Start site-based services at Medlar View Elementary. Since then, the program has just kept expanding.

This year administrators from MVCDC and the school district came to the table and worked out how they could serve even more children.

Thanks to a \$50,000 grant from the Ohio Department of Education and a \$250,000 commitment from **Dayton-Montgomery County Preschool Promise**, Miamisburg now has four preschool classrooms at Medlar View Elementary for the 2022-23 school year, in addition to the 15 sessions already in place at Miamisburg's Maddux-Lang Primary School.

Two of the classes at Medlar View are jointly staffed with teachers from MVCDC and the school district, and all families receive assistance from an MVCDC Family Support Specialist. Children in all four classes are attending for a full school-day.

MVCDC and Miamisburg teachers are sharing curricula and ideas to support children, and they're participating in both organizations' professional development.

Importantly, MVCDC classrooms at Medlar View are open to children who wouldn't normally qualify for Head Start - an exciting benefit of this new cost-sharing arrangement. Twenty-five percent of children in each classroom are able to access preschool that may otherwise be out of reach.

"I would describe our partnership as a beautiful evolution," says Amy Dobson, Director of Elementary Education for Miamisburg City Schools. This new collaboration, she says, means more children will start kindergarten ready to learn.

Classrooms at both schools were almost immediately full - validation of families' interest in high quality early learning.

"Every teacher, every assistant teacher, is there because they want to be a part of what we're doing," says Amy.

Ashley Cranford, an assistant MVCDC teacher who's working alongside a Lead Teacher employed by Miamisburg, says the partnership is great for children.

"If a child needs occupational or speech therapy, working directly with Miamisburg, we can get that process started before they hit kindergarten. We're not leaving any children behind."

Ashley, who has worked for MVCDC for 11 years, loves that MVCDC staff have been invited to everything from Halloween events to dances at her school, "We feel like family here."



For over 20 years, Maggie Bollar has been bringing books, rhymes, songs, and good times to Laura Patterson's classroom.

"She's so animated the kids can't help but sit still," says Laura, a Lead Teacher at Clark ECEC. "She's bubbly, she's energetic, she's kind, and she knows the children and what they need."

But Maggie isn't a fixture just in Laura's classroom. A children's librarian at the **New Carlisle Public Library** since 1999, Maggie makes visits, often on a monthly basis, to multiple MVCDC sites across Clark County.

"I read a lot of ridiculous books — the most outrageous books," she says. "They are the ones the kids will ask for over and over again."

While she knows MVCDC teachers appreciate her passion for helping children learn to love books, she is grateful to them, too.

"I've learned so much from the Head Start teachers," she says. How to help children transition from one activity to another and how to encourage calmness are just some of the strategies she's watched and models.

Even during the pandemic, Maggie was still a presence, reading to students outdoors and to them and their families via Zoom.

MVCDC teachers are "artists in the classrooms," Maggie says. "They have wonderful skills."

Maggie was instrumental in helping bring **Dolly Parton Imagination Library Ohio** to Clark County
and relied on MVCDC staff to help families sign up
and allow their child to receive a free book every
month. MVCDC families are invited to join the
initiative when they enroll.

A new partnership Maggie wants to begin is inviting teachers to record themselves reading books, so children can call the library and listen to their teacher even when they're not in school.

Laura, who has been with MVCDC for 29 years, is grateful for partnerships like the one she has with Maggie and relishes being in the classroom. "I love when you've been working on a skill with a child, especially a social-emotional skill, and then suddenly they get it."

At MVCDC, children learn by EXPERIENCING

If you're a preschooler at a Clark County MVCDC program, you probably know "Artie."

A perky mouse puppet, "Artie" explains to young visitors to the **Springfield Museum of Art** that "you look, but don't touch" the paintings.

Amy Korpieski, the museum's Art Educator, and "Artie" have been sharing their love of art with 500 MVCDC young learners every year since 2015. It's a "fantastic" partnership, says Elvira Smith, Education Supervisor, at the Springfield Children's Center.

Thanks to Amy's ideas and the support of the Virginia W. Kettering Family Foundation, imaginative, educational art activities are the norm at MVCDC programs. Elvira, for instance, says she uses chalk in ways that never would have occurred to her.

Formerly a children's librarian, Amy says that the **Springfield Museum of Art** is thrilled to welcome even young children and to help encourage their curiosity and wonder.

After the children meet "Artie," Amy takes them into the galleries where they discuss what's happening in a painting and learn about colors like teal and aqua marine. Then they move to an art studio where she has stations for the children to try their hand at making something beautiful.

"I always plan for studio art to be collaborative," Amy says. "Conflict resolution is smoother when everybody wants to create together." Museum visits last for an hour, and some children come for a series of three classes.



When COVID-19 hit, Amy says she and MVCDC didn't just "throw up our hands." They planned outdoor activities, learned about art that Amy brought to the children, worked on creative movement and continued making art, often with a literature component.

Elivra, who attended Head Start as a child, says a favorite activity was when the children learned about bees, pollination and wild flowers. Amy brought plastic pipettes to demonstrate how bees collect nectar, pollinating flowers in the process. Then they used the science tool and watercolor paint to create whimsical works resembling stained glass.

"The children listen to Amy," says Elvira, a 26-year veteran at MVCDC. "She's an attention-getter. And she's a vocabulary-builder, teaching the children terms like 'abstract.' I can't believe my luck that we get to do this together."

Now a supervisor, Elvira says she's experiencing "withdrawal from my babies," so "I still go in the classroom to get my love."






We look for new ways to SUPPORT FAMILIES

Thanks to a partnership with the **Community Health Centers of Greater Dayton**, MVCDC's Kings Highway and Marilyn E. Thomas centers are providing children free dental services on site.

Dr. Angelica McHugh, who comes once a month to each center, does dental exams on "as many children as they can bring me." She may see up to 10 children in a day.



With their family's permission, the children get their teeth cleaned and receive a fluoride treatment. If Dr. McHugh, who is from Texas and loves speaking Spanish to dual-language learners, spots a cavity, the children are referred to area dentists.

Amber Saltis, an MVCDC Health Specialist, says children are drawn to Dr. McHugh. They appreciate that she lets them hold an Elmo doll or a squeeze ball during their visit, and they're excited to get a prize — stickers, sunglasses, Slinkies, or a rubber duck with teeth. And, of course, they leave with a new toothbrush, toothpaste, and dental floss.

Ensuring the kids have a good experience ideally results in their telling their classroom friends they should visit Dr. McHugh, too.

Amber, who has been the driving force in getting children signed up for screenings and cleanings, says she took her job at MVCDC because the interviewer told her that MVCDC is committed to teaching children and making sure they "don't go home hungry." "That spoke to my heart."

She is passionate about helping families find a dental "home" for their child because early dental care can improve children's speech and eating habits — and encourage them to smile.

"Amber is so motivated to get the kids screened, and she always makes time to brainstorm about how we can get more kids in," Dr. McHugh says.

Amber, who was hired as a Licensed Practical Nurse and recently became a registered nurse, says she appreciates the flexibility and help she received from MVCDC while she was earning her degree.

"I love working with Dr. McHugh," Amber says. "You can tell she cares. She's funny, and sometimes she even sings to the kids. One child told her she wanted to be a dentist."

Kristina Wright, a Family Support Specialist in Madison County, is always on the lookout for places where she can meet families who would benefit from MVCDC's services.



That's why she appreciates the **DNA Community Center** in Plain City and Tamara Reed, its executive director.

A faith-based non-profit, the **DNA Center** takes its name from "daily needs assistance." The organization has a food pantry, a personal needs pantry, a kids' closet, and it offers a free hot breakfast on Saturdays to typically 100 people. It also runs a summer camp for 125 students, offers mentoring for almost 50 school-aged children, and organizes whole-family English as Second Language classes.

Supported by churches, businesses, and grants, Tamara says the agency is successful because of its volunteer "army" that can involve 2,000 people over the course of a year.

Kristina has been to the center's Saturday breakfasts with an eye toward identifying new families who need high quality early learning and child care for their children.

"We're a great place for agencies like MVCDC to make an in-person connection to families who need Head Start the most," says Tamara.

Kristina and Tamara say Madison County has seen an influx of Hispanic and Ukrainian families experiencing poverty because the county has several affordable mobile home parks. Families are drawn to work at nearby construction and restaurant jobs. MVCDC is also serving families who are reeling from the opioid epidemic.

Kristina has worked at three different sites during her four years with MVCDC, and she's excited to be serving families now where she grew up.



She's committed to fostering the partnerships MVCDC has in Madison County with the Madison-Plains and Jonathan Alder local school districts, where MVCDC collectively operates five classrooms.

Kristina says she appreciates Tamara because when she went to a pancake breakfast, Tamara knew everyone from the families to the volunteers.

"If I have a good relationship with partners like Tamara and the **DNA Center**, I can serve my families better," she says.




